MESSAGE FROM SHERIFF BRIAN BURNETT

2013 was definitely a year of building new partnerships, and rebuilding and strengthening our relationships with seasoned partners.

As negotiations with our contract cities carried over from 2012 and well into 2013, many issues and topics other than economics eventually rose to our attention. 2013 also proved to be historical in the signing of the 2014 – 2016 Deputy Sheriff’s Association agreement. This is the first time since prior to 2002 that a signed agreement was accomplished prior to the expiration of the previous contract. This is a great benefit to the county, as we strive to best predict and write an accurate budget to include salaries and benefits from our agreements, prior to the Commissioner’s Office finalizing the budget, thus avoiding potential litigation and unexpected retroactive pay in the future. Another positive factor in this process was the many labor management meetings that were held between the Sheriff’s Administration and the Deputy Sheriff’s Association Board Members to work out any current or potential future issues. I would like to extend my gratitude to both the Commissioner’s Office and the Deputy Sheriff’s Association for their commitment and engagement through the process to make this happen.

2014 is the fourth year of my first term as Chelan County Sheriff. Even though we have successfully conquered many challenges over the past three years, I realize there will be more obstacles in the future. DETECTIVES DIVISION

In 2013 the Chelan County Detectives Division was called upon to conduct several high profile investigations for surrounding outside agencies. The Detectives Division was the lead agency in the homicide investigation for Okanogan County that also included an officer involved shooting. The investigation resulted in the arrest of one suspect for 1st degree murder. The Chelan County Detectives investigated an "in-custody death" incident for the Douglas County Sheriff's Office. Detectives were also the lead investigating agency in a fatal officer involved shooting for the Wenatchee Police Department and assisted in a second officer involved shooting for Wenatchee Police Department.

The Registered Sex Offender tracking and verification system was restructured in 2013, as our division welcomed and trained a new Detective in this area of expertise. We are confident that with this restructure we will have a more effective and efficient way to manage the system and in turn keep the proper community entities informed.

PATROL DIVISION

The Chelan County Patrol Unit is the largest and most visible representatives of the Sheriff's Office. The Patrol Unit is the backbone of the Sheriff's Office. They are often the first contact that citizens have with our Sheriff's Office. The Patrol Unit strives to uphold the Chelan County Sheriff's Office core values of Integrity, Teamwork, and Excellence while serving citizens and visitors in the county.

The Patrol Unit is made up of four Squads that work rotating 12 hour shifts. Each of the two day Squads has a Sergeant, Corporal, and six Deputies. Each of the two night squads has a Sergeant, Corporal, and seven Deputies. These four squads patrol areas of the county and are available to service their areas based on calls for service, investigating suspicious activity, unusual occurrences, and contractual agreements. They provide Community Policing, Traffic Enforcement, Community Services, and Community Education. The squads' personnel are divided into areas: North (Chelan, Manson, Entiat), Valley (Monitor, Wenatchee, Malaga, Sunnyslope), and West (Lake Wenatchee, Leavenworth, Cashmere). In addition to these squad patrols, we have the following:

City of Leavenworth – Leavenworth has a Sergeant assigned to its city. The Sergeant is responsible for coordinating any events that occur in the city limits as well as directed patrols as needed. The Sergeant directly communicates with city officials regarding any issues that arise. This Sergeant has one Deputy,

a School Resource Officer (SRO), that is assigned to him/her. This SRO divides his/her time between the school districts of Cashmere and Leavenworth.

City of Chelan - Chelan has a Sergeant assigned to its city. The Sergeant is responsible for coordinating any events that occur in the city limits as well as directed patrols as needed. The base of operation is in the old Chelan Police Department building. The Sergeant directly communicates with city officials regarding any issues that arise. This Sergeant has one Deputy, a School Resource Officer (SRO), that is assigned to him/her. This SRO divides his/her time between the school districts of Chelan and Manson and works as the "Chelan Deputy" throughout the year.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Traffic Unit consists of two Traffic Deputies and one Commercial Vehicle Truck Enforcement Deputy. They are responsible for performing traffic enforcement, traffic safety education, and collision investigation within the county. The Traffic Unit works in partnership with Chelan County Public Works regarding any problems with roadways, signage, parking issues, collisions, traffic, road weight restrictions, county code enforcement for builders/landowners/right of way issues. The Traffic Unit will also add a Supervisor position in 2014.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

School Resource Officers have three main roles and responsibilities. One is that of a Sheriff's Office Deputy. Another is that of a law-related counselor and law-related educator who develop relationships with students. An SRO's primary role, however, is to provide law enforcement-type services to a school to encourage everyone to follow all of the school regulations. SRO's investigate allegations of criminal incidents and make referrals of students to juvenile authorities when necessary. SRO's work to reduce juvenile delinquency rates by establishing close contact with students and to build positive relationships with them. SRO's also conduct security inspections, monitor crime statistics and work with school administrators and students to design crime prevention strategies. The ability to work closely with school administrators is a must for any SRO, as is the ability to train school personnel in handling crisis situations. SRO's also attend and participate in many school functions.

RESERVE DEPUTIES

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Reserve Program is comprised of men and women who volunteer their time to serve the community and the Sheriff's Office. They assist fully-commissioned Deputies in their daily work assignments, providing additional law enforcement resources to better serve the citizens of Chelan County. They also assist with crime scenes, special events, and community events. Reserve Deputies are armed and granted a limited commission by the Sheriff upon completion of the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission Reserve Academy.

S.W.A.T



The Chelan County Regional SWAT team is a multi-agency tactical response team covering many cities in Chelan County and surrounding areas, such as Wenatchee, East Wenatchee, Cashmere, Entiat, Malaga, Leavenworth, Chelan, as well as responding to outside agencies through mutual aid requests. The team operators have collateral duties within their respective departments and are activated as needed. The team consists of 7 Deputies from Chelan County, 7 Officers from the Wenatchee Police Department and 2 Tactical Paramedics (TacMeds - who have a Special Commission to carry firearms).

Every team member is an operator, but many have specialty training: i.e., sniper/observer, chemical agent operations, less lethal, breaching, hostage negotiations and shield specialist. Many of the operators are also certified instructors in firearms, high angle rescue techniques, defensive tactics, less lethal weapons and K-9.

The team utilizes two personnel carriers with ballistic protection, an armored transport vehicle, an SUV, a CCSO OH-58 helicopter for air support and other specialized equipment.

Team members undergo a strict testing process which includes; physical fitness test, firearms proficiency, firearms mock scenario, comprehensive arrest scenario and oral board. Once a member of the team, operators must pass a physical standards test (2 times yearly) and firearms (4 times yearly for pistol and M4 rifle and 6 times for snipers). The team's mission is to save lives and to support area law enforcement agencies with a tactical response to critical incidents and high risk operations. The team trains monthly to handle these situations, which include high risk search warrants, active shooter response, hostage situations, barricaded subjects, positive pressure vehicle take downs, train assaults, hydroelectric dam intervention, bus assaults, tactical man tracking and marijuana eradication.



COLUMBIA RIVER DRUG TASK FORCE

The Columbia River Drug Task Force handled 47 methamphetamine related cases, 17 heroin related cases, 6 cocaine related cases and 7 diverted pharmaceutical cases in 2013. Although methamphetamine is still the number 1 drug in the Wenatchee Valley, heroin is becoming more and more popular along with the combination of the 2 drugs. The drug addicts that use them in the Wenatchee Valley are responsible for the majority of burglaries, thefts, shoplifting, identity theft, forgery, and vehicle prowls, thus having a major effect on the citizens of the Wenatchee Valley. In addition to targeting mid-to upper-level drug dealers in our community, we also tried to prioritize cases involving drug dealers that were gang members. One case in particular involved a gang member who was selling drugs and stolen firearms. Through the course of the investigation, 4 firearms were purchased or recovered, 3 of which were reported stolen from vehicle prowls that occurred in Wenatchee and East Wenatchee.

The Columbia River Drug Task Force worked with the Department of Homeland Security and the Wenatchee Police Department on a joint investigation that led to the largest seizure in the task force's history. The investigation led to over 20 pounds of methamphetamine, 10 pounds of heroin, 4 pounds of cocaine, and two guns being seized. This investigation yielded valuable intelligence information that we were able to share with the drug enforcement agency and other drug task forces across the state in regards to transporting, concealing, and packaging drugs. This case also confirmed our suspicions that Mexican drug trafficking organizations are dealing drugs in our community and we are working vigilantly to dismantle and disrupt those organizations.

Two new detectives started with the Columbia River drug task force this last year. Detective Grant Giacomazzi from the Washington State Patrol and Detective Jordan Orrell from the Wenatchee Police Department. Detective Giacomazzi brings 17 years of law enforcement experience to the drug task force.





EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT



During 2013, the Chelan County Department of Emergency Management (DEM) responded to several incidents of natural disaster within the county. Three significant wildfires and two flash flood situations displaced residents and created transportation issues. The DEM staff assisted in managing responses to all of these incidents.

The Colockum-Tarps Fire, a human-caused incident, started in late July during a high wind event. The fire eventually burned 80,184 acres within Chelan and Kittitas Counties. Five houses and three additional structures burned in our county. Several residents of the Colockum and Tarpiscan areas were displaced or put on a Level 3 evacuation notice throughout the fire response.

In mid-August, the Milepost 10 Fire ignited from a lightning strike above the Malaga-Alcoa Highway. Several residents in the area were placed on a “Level 3” evacuation notice during the fire, but no structures were lost. As this fire eventually burned 5,445 acres, a strong weather cell of moisture moved into the area and created a significant flash flood in the Colockum Creek area. The already burn scarred ground combined with several inches of rainfall in a two hour period caused large rocks, debris, and mud to overflow Colockum Creek. The flash flood also affected the Number 1 and Number 2 Canyons near the City of Wenatchee with runoff and mud flow.

Water and debris crossed the Tarpiscan Road as it flowed toward the Columbia River, and caused a large portion of the Colockum Road (at milepost 12) to be undercut by the flash flood run off. The highway was closed for several days while the Chelan County Public Works Department rebuilt the infrastructure of the road. During this event, one home was inundated by mud and debris while other property owners needed assistance with mitigating both mud and water that covered their property and hampered access to their homes

In late August, the Eagle Fire began northeast of Leavenworth in the Eagle Creek valley. The lightning strike fire burned 1,475 acres and over 60 homes were placed on evacuation notice. Firefighters were successful in containing the fire without the loss of any residences or other structures. Chelan County DEM was tied into the incident management of this fire which reached the level of a State Type II team assignment during the most active phase of the fire.



SEARCH & RESCUE



The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue Unit responded to 35 calls for service during 2013. Several of the incidents involved hikers with minor injuries needing assistance in exiting the wilderness areas to receive medical attention. However, there were two fatality incidents during the year.

In May, a male subject attempting to float the level 5+ whitewater of the Wenatchee River in the Tumwater Canyon was ejected out of his 'Creature Craft' inflatable raft as it inverted in the river. The subject was located in an eddy downriver from the whitewater, but could not be revived.

In August, a female climber/hiker died after having descended from the Snow Creek Wall in the Icicle Canyon area. The subject was attempting to traverse a rocky area at the base of the rock wall after completing the initial climb. Rocks gave way underneath her footing and she fell over 150 feet down a steep slope.

Many other rescues involved responses from trained Chelan Deputies along side Sheriff's Office Search & Rescue volunteers, and Chelan County Mountain Rescue (CCMR) volunteers. The Sheriff's Office works closely with CCMR, Cascade Medical Center medics, and USFS personnel during search and rescue missions.



A major search was initiated on June 11, 2013 for a 79 year old female mushroom gatherer last known to be in the Minnow Creek Trail below Basalt Peak in the west county. It was determined Hildegard Hendrickson was last seen at the trailhead near her vehicle on June 8, 2013. Family did not realize she had not returned to her Seattle home until three days later. More than 2,400 hours of searcher and coordination time was logged during a six day search effort. Several follow-up searches have been conducted since the original large scale effort. As of this time, no solid clues have been developed in the case of Hendrickson.

HIGH ANGLE ROPE RESCUE TEAM

The CCSO High Angle Rope Rescue Team is a specialty team within search and rescue. HARRT conducts rescue and recovery operations in high angle (60-90 degree slope) and steep angle (30-60 degree) terrain. The CCSO HARRT team consists of eight commissioned Deputies. Most of the HARRT Deputies are technician level certified in rope rescue.

Several volunteers train consistently with the HARRT team, many of which are technician level certified. HARRT also works regularly along side Chelan County Mountain Rescue, a team of highly experienced, well trained volunteers who are willing to respond to emergencies. These volunteers are essential to the operation of CCSO HARRT.

All CCSO HARRT team members are equipped with personal gear that allows them to respond directly from patrol duty or their residence when needed. Through consistent training and dedication, the CCSO HARRT team is able to respond quickly when needed to high and steep angle rescues within Chelan County.

MARINE PATROL

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit is staffed by one full-time Marine Patrol Supervisor, one half-time Marine Patrol Deputy and Marine Patrol Volunteers. They are responsible for patrolling the lakes and rivers of Chelan County year round. Additionally Marine Patrol staff are responsible for hosting and teaching the Washington State Parks Adventures In Boating classes, conducting marine presentations to civic groups and schools, maintaining three Chelan County Sheriff's Office boats and City of Chelan navigational aids, enforcing state and local marine laws, investigating vessel accidents, coordinating other Marine Patrol activities with the US Forest Service and Department of Fish and Wildlife, quarterly activity reports, and special emphasis reports.

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit will continue to use enforcement, education, and maintain water navigation on Lake Chelan in an effort to make it a safe and enjoyable environment for recreational boaters.

K-9 UNIT

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office currently has two working canines teams. The first is Detective Carlos Rodriguez and his narcotics canine, Reefer. Reefer is a Black Lab mix who is trained in narcotics detection. Because of recent case law in Washington State Reefer's ability to work has been restricted on live applications such as traffic stops, search incident to arrest, and other areas, but it has not stopped him completely. Det. Rodriguez and Reefer still actively assist with drug arrests, the Columbia River Drug Task Force, and local schools in our area. Det. Rodriguez has a good working relationship with the school districts within Chelan County and often times performs presentations and surprise locker inspections. The locker inspections are at the request of the local school districts and are a great visual deterrent to having narcotics on school grounds. Our second working canine team is Deputy Mike Lamon and his patrol dog, Axel. Axel is a large German Shepard trained in criminal apprehension, criminal tracking, and evidence collection. Deputy Lamon and Axel are more of a "hands-on" team assisting other patrol units, other agencies, and our local Multi-agency SWAT team. Axel had several criminal apprehensions in 2013 and all occurred without the canine physically contacting the suspect. This is the most desired outcome, because the suspect is taken into custody without injury to the deputies, canine, or suspect. The suspect simply gives up at the site of the K-9, its loud barking, and the fear of being physically contacted by the canine.

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office received two large donation in 2013 to specifically purchase another patrol canine and a Search and Rescue canine. There are high costs associated with the purchase, training, and upkeep of a canine. With the two donations the Sheriff's Office will be able to purchase and train two new dogs in 2014 without affecting the Sheriff's Office budget. The Sheriff's Office has already announced the two new canine positions and will soon begin the testing process to select two new canine handlers. We are also currently researching the best options of where to purchase two new canines and locating the most effective training facility to meet our needs.

CIVIL DIVISION

The Civil Division executes and serves legal documents throughout the county, performs evictions, enforces the orders of the court and holds sales of real and personal property. Civil process is a term that covers the service of pleadings, motions, orders, and other papers to parties involved in civil cases, and the service of orders that enforce judgments entered by the courts. In Washington State, process service is a mandated responsibility of the Sheriff's office, and for the most part, only the office of Sheriff may perform civil process duties.

The Sheriff must use due diligence in carrying out any civil process given to the Sheriff for service. The difficulty in serving process depends sometimes on the kind of process to be served, and at other times on the behavior of the person to be served, especially if they are attempting to avoid service.

RECORDS DIVISION

The Records Division serves as the first point of contact that many people have with the Sheriff's Office. Thousands of people visit the front counter of the Sheriff's Office for assistance with Concealed Pistol Licenses, public disclosure requests, incident reports and numerous other inquiries. The Records Division is committed to customer service and take great pride in providing service to the community. The Records Division also processes all criminal and supplemental reports generated by the Sheriff's Office as well as processing requests for collision reports, criminal cases and criminal history information for the County Courts.

Over the course of the last year, the individuals that make up the Records Division have donated their time to community events. A collective group participated in the "Shop With A Cop" event that was sponsored by the Salvation Army, which helped school age children purchase back to school items. Another group donated their time to removing the official patches from obsolete department issued coats so that the coats could be donated to surrounding area shelters.






